Hardik Pandya lifts India to 196/5 against Bangladesh

Hardik Pandya's blistering unbeaten 50 off just 27 deliveries propelled India to a commanding total of 196/5 against Bangladesh in a crucial Super-8 T20 World Cup clash at the Sir Vivian Richards Stadium here. Pandya's innings was a masterclass in power-hitting, as he showcased his ability to score quickly and decisively under pressure. His knock included four boundaries and three massive sixes, which not only accelerated In-dia's scoring rate but also demoralised the Bangladeshi bowlers in the death overs.

Coming in when India needed a late surge, Pandya wasted no time in settling down. He accounted for loose deliveries, particularly targeting Mustafizur Rahman and Rishad Hossain, who struggled to contain his aggressive strokes. Pandya's fifty was a testament to his ability to adapt to different match situations and deliver when

EAS Prasanna advocates for quota for state cricketers in IPL



Bengaluru (UNI): As the Indian Premier League (IPL) continues to captivate millions of cricket fans around the world, there has been a persistent debate about the inclusion of local talent in the league. EAS Prasanna, a legendary former cricketer, has voiced his opinion on this matter, suggesting the introduction of a quota system for state cricketers alongside Indian and foreign players. However, as Prasanna pointed out, the dynamics of investment and re-turns took precedence. "When the IPL started,

No franchise will invest money without expecting a return, and the BCCI's rules allowed overseas players in the playing XI," he told UNI on the sidelines of the unveiling of Maharaja T20 Trophy 2024 here on late Friday night.

Skipping even a single day sets back my progress significantly.'

Mirabai's determination to overcome setbacks was palpable as she discussed her aspirations for the Paris Olympics. "An

Asian Games medal remains a goal. Despite being close in Hangzhou, an untimely injury halted my progress," she lamented. "However, setbacks fuel my determination to return stronger for India.

Heartbreak for Georgia as Lobjanidze misses golden chance in 1-1 draw

In a tense Group F encounter at Hamburg's Volksparkstadion here on Saturday, Georgia's Euro 2024 hopes were marred by a missed chance in stoppage time by Saba Lobjanidze, allowing the Czech Republic to escape with a 1-1 draw. The match was defined by high drama and missed opportunities from both sides, but none more glaring than Lobjanidze's chance in the dying moments. With the game poised at 1-1 and the final whistle looming, Georgia launched a lightning counter-attack that left Lobjanidze with only the goalkeeper to beat.

In a moment that could have secured Georgia's historic first win in a major tournament, Lobjanidze leaned back and skied his shot over the crossbar, leaving him visibly distraught and his teammates consoling him. Earlier in the game, Georgia had taken the lead just before halftime when Georges Mikautadze calmly converted a penalty in the 45th minute plus stoppage time. However, the Czech Republic responded in the 59th minute when Patrik Schick capitalised on Ondrej Lingr's

header to equalise, denying Geor-gia their maiden victory in Euro 2024.

The match was a tale of two halves, with the Czech Republic dominating possession and creat-ing numerous chances in the second half, only to be thwarted by Georgia's resilient defense and goalkeeper, Giorgi Mamardashvili who made several crucial saves throughout the game. Despite the disappointment of conceding late and missing out on a potential win, Georgia will take solace in se curing their first-ever point in a major tournament. The Czech Republic, on the other hand, will rue missed opportunities to secure all three points and will need a positive result in their final group game to strengthen their chances of advancing.

The physicality of the contest was evident, with several yellow cards shown, reflecting the intensity of the battle on the field. Later today, attention in Group F will turn to the clash between Turkey and Portugal, with both teams aiming to capitalise on the draw between Georgia and the Czech Republic.

GST Council exempts certain railway services from GST, approves measures to ease compliance

Providing relief to smaller firms and taxpayers, the all-powerful GST Council on Saturday decided to exempt certain services provided by Indian Railways, reduce the quantum of pre-deposit required to be paid for fil-ing appeals under GST, and fix monetary limits for filing appeals in order to substantially cut litigation.

The GST Council also clarified on a number of procedural issues to ease the compliance burden on taxpayers. 'The GST Council, in its meeting on Saturday, has taken a lot of decisions on trade facilitation, easing compliance burdens, and giving relief to taxpayers in terms of compliance," Union Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman said in a media briefing after the 53rd GST Council meeting held here.

The Minister, who also heads the GST Council, said that while there were a lot of issues on which the Fitment Committee and the Legal Committee had worked and readied quite a few agenda points, all of them could not be taken up for lack of time. said that the remaining agenda items would be taken up in the next meeting, which could be scheduled in August this year following the presentation of the Union Budget in Parliament. Sitharaman noted that the decisions taken by the GST Council today would benefit traders, MSMEs, and taxpayers.

Significantly, the GST Council recommended exempting the services provided by Indian Railways to the general public, namely the sale of

platform tickets, the facility of retiring rooms or waiting rooms, cloak room services, and battery-operated car services. The Council also recommended certain exemptions related to accommodation services, providing relief to students and working professionals.

Among changes in GST rates on goods, the Council decided to reduce the tax rate on 'carton, boxes, and cases of both corrugated and non-corrugated paper or paper-board' from

18% to 12%. Further, all milk cans (of steel, iron and aluminium) irrespective of their use, will attract 12% GST. All solar cookers, whether single or dual energy sources, will attract 12% GST. The GST Council recommended waiving interest and penalties for demand notices issued under Section 73 of the CGST Act (i.e. the cases not involving fraud, suppression or willful misstatement, etc.) for the fiscal years 2017–18, 2018–19, and 2019–20 if the full tax demanded is paid up to March 31, 2025.

It is also recommended that the time limit to avail input tax credit with respect to any invoice or debit note under Section 16(4) of the CGST Act, through any GSTR 3B return filed up to November 30, 2021 for FY 2017-18, 2018-19, 2019-20, and 2020-21, may be deemed to be November 30, 2021.

The Council recommended to prescribe monetary limits, subject to certain exclusions, for filing of appeals in GST by the department before GST Appellate Tribunal (GSTAT), High Court, and Supreme Court, to reduce government litigation.
