Bhopal: In response to the heightened tensions between India and Pakistan, Madhya Pradesh is fortifying its security apparatus. Chief Minister Dr. Mohan Yadav convened a high-level review meeting at Samatva Bhawan on Friday, summoning top officials to assess the state's preparedness. As a precautionary measure, he has im-



posed a ban on all leave for government officers and employees across departments.

During the crucial briefing, Chief Minister Yadav emphasized that national security is the para-mount duty, and the safety of all citizens takes precedence given the current geopolitical climate. He di-rected senior officials to ensure the seamless functioning of essential public services, urging all departments to strengthen their internal systems and implement all necessary security protocols with imme-

Dr. Yadav stressed the need for a zero-tolerance approach towards any anti-national propaganda and called for proactive measures to educate citizens against heeding rumors. He mandated heightened security around critical central and state government establishments. Furthermore, he instructed the bolstering of disaster management capabilities, including health and fire

Reviewing the latest security arrangements, the status of civic amenities, and inter-departmental coordination, the Chief Minister urged officials to enhance their synergy. He underscored the imperative for all departments to maintain a state of high alert and readiness for any potential emergency. Until normalcy returns, officials and field personnel involved in the smooth delivery of essential citizen services have been directed to remain on duty, with all leave requests suspended. This decisive move underscores the state government's unwavering commitment to maintaining peace and security during these sensitive times.

No leave for doctors and medical staff amid heightened emergency preparedness

Health services to operate at full capacity round-the-clock

Bhopal: In light of recent national security concerns and fresh advi-sories from the Central Government, Madhya Pradesh has placed all public health and medical education institutions on high alert. The state health department has directed that no leaves will be granted to doctors, paramedical staff, or supporting personnel until further notice.

All government and AYUSH health facilities have been instructed to remain fully operational and maintain a state of maximum readiness to handle any emergency situation. Round-the-clock availability of critical medical equipment, stretchers, oxygen supplies, and life-saving drugs has been mandated across all hospitals. Mobile medical units, am-bulances, and emergency response

vehicles are to remain on standby with essential staff and supplies. The government has also stressed continuous monitoring of medicine stocks, with instructions

to report any shortages to the health directorate immediately. Hospitals directorate immediately. Hospitals must ensure operational readiness of ICUs, operation theatres, pathology labs, and blood banks.

Cyber security has also been flagged as a priority, with staff asked to remain vigilant against digital threats.

These robust measures are part of a proactive strategy to safeguard public health and ensure uninterrupted emergency care in case of national or regional crises. The mes sage is clear: Madhya Pradesh's healthcare system is on high alert and ready to respond.

CM Yadav's promise paradigm

Fewer pledges, faster progress in Madhya Pradesh

Furthermore, work is actively underway on a substantial 461 of the remaining commit-

This measured approach is underpinned by a meticulous vetting process. While elected officials often present lengthy lists of de-mands during the Chief Minister's

visits, the CM's secretariat proactively gathers feedback from district collectors to assess the practicality and potential impact of proposed announcements. This en-

sures that only viable and benefi-

cial projects are publicly endorsed.

Demand for infrastructure and roads is highest in urban areas

Interestingly, the highest number of announcements (80) fall under the purview of the Urban Development and Housing Depart ment, closely followed by the Public Works Department (77), indicating a strong focus on infrastructure and essential amenities.

Save some for the next

When faced with an overwhelming influx of requests, Dr. Yadav reportedly employs a pragmatic approach, quipping to local leaders, "Do you only want to invite me once? Save some requests for next time!" This strategy not only manages expectations but also encourages a more strategic and sustainable approach to develop-ment, prioritizing impactful pro-jects over a mere tally of promises. Dr. Yadav's focus on fewer, wellconsidered announcements coupled with a drive for swift implementation signals a new era of governance in Madhya Pradesh.

Health Department's transfer process goes fully online

Applications open until May 31

Bhopal: In a major administrative reform, the Department of Public Health and Family Welfare has launched a completely digital transfer process for its staff through the newly developed e-HRMS portal. With Cabinet approval granted, this move marks a significant shift towards transparency, efficiency, and employee empowerment.

Under the new policy, over 46,000 health personnel, including those under the National Health Mission (NHM) on contractual terms will now be able to apply for transfers online. The e-HRMS portal will handle the entire process from application to final orderdigitally, eliminating manual paperwork and delays. The portal also lists vacant positions across the state, making it easier for employees to make informed choices.

Applications open from May 13 and will be accepted until May 31, according to the official announcement. All eligible employees are encouraged to apply through

ehrms.nic.in. Deputy Chief Minister Rajendra Shukla confirmed the development, stating, "With Cabinet approval in place, transfers at the state level will be executed by May 31. This new policy ensures fairness and faster processing, benefiting both the system and the staff."

Security tightened for CM Dr. Mohan Yadav amid India-Pakistan tensions



Portable ballistic shield, increased personnel now part of CM's security

Bhopal: In light of heightened national security concerns and esca-Pakistan, the security cover for Madhya Pradesh Chief Minister Dr. Mohan Yadav has been significantly upgraded.

As part of the enhanced measures, a portable fold-out ballistic shield—commonly used for VIP protection during high-risk scenarios—has been added to his security apparatus. Additionally, the number of officers and security personnel assigned to him has also been increased.

Weather scientists attribute this dramatic shift to a confluence of weather systems: a Western Disturbance, a trough, and cyclonic circulation. This active weather pattern has prompted the issuance of alerts for various districts, anticipating thunder-storms, gusty winds, and lightning in different regions.

The weather department has specifically flagged Bhopal, Sheopur Kalan, Betul, Harda, and Anuppur for likely thunderstorms and lightning. Showers are also antici-pated in Shivpuri, Ashoknagar,



and Raisen. Residents in Narsinghpur, Chhindwara, Seoni, Singrauli, and Shahdol can expect rainfall later in the evening. This wide-spread wet spell offers a welcome break from the rising temperatures typically associated with this time of year.

Gwalior on high alert amid India-Pakistan tensions

Gwalior: As tensions escalate between India and Pakistan, Gwalior has been put on high alert with several precautionary measures. High alert at Gwalior Air **Force Station**

curity around the airbase has been strengthened, with police conducting rigorous checks within a 5kilometer radius of the base and throughout the city. Security personnel have been carrying out search operations in nearby villages, including those hosting wedding celebrations, as part of enhanced vigilance.
On Friday, all flights from

Gwalior Airport were canceled, continuing the disruption of air travel that began earlier this week. Passengers were informed that all flights to and from Gwalior's Rajmata Vijayaraje Scindia Air Termi nal, including direct flights to Delhi, Bengaluru, and Mumbai, have been canceled until May 9. Additionally, stringent checks are being carried out on all roads leading to the airbase, including Bhind-Itawa Road, DD Nagar Road, Gola ka Mandir, and the Gwalior bypass.

Entry to the Air Force Station has been restricted for all external individuals as a precautionary measure. The heightened security is a reflection of the increasing need to safeguard national security amid the rising threats from across
