Anderson-Tendulkar Trophy unveiled for England-India Tests

England and India greats James Anderson and Sachin Tendulkar named trophy - the Anderson-Tendulkar Trophy – which will be contested in future Test series between the two nations.

The England and Wales Board (ECB) unveiled the new trophy, which features the imagery of both Tendulkar and Anderson and also has their signatures engraved on it as a tribute to the two stalwarts.

The two greats were present to mark the occasion ahead of the upcoming five-Test series between the two sides starting on Friday.

The Pataudi family, after whom

the previous Pataudi Trophy was named, will continue to be honoured through the introduction of the Pataudi Medal, a new accolade that will be awarded to the winning captain of the series.

Anderson, who represented England in 188 Test matches, claimed a whooping 704 wickets in the longest format – the third-highest in the format – before bringing the curtains down on his career



last year after a five-Test series in India last year.

The masterful seamer brought his best against India, amassing an incredible 149 wickets from 39 Tests, at an average of 25.47, including six five-wicket hauls, an

"It's a proud moment for me and my family to have this iconic series named after Sachin and myself," Anderson was quoted in a state-

"The rivalry between our two nations has always been something special, full of history, intensity and unforgettable moments," he said. "To be recognised in this way is a real honour. I'm looking forward to seeing the next chapter unfold in England this summer. It promises to be compelling, competitive cricket - exactly what you'd expect from two great sides. This is elite sport at its finest," Anderson said.
India's legendary batter, Sachin

Tendulkar, the first player with 200 Test caps, closed his red-ball career in 2013 with the most runs in the format, a record he still holds with a mammoth 15,921 runs, which include 51 centuries.

The Indian icon delivered some memorable displays against England, scoring 2,535 runs at an average of 51.73, with a highest score of 193 at Headingley, the venue for the upcoming Test between the two

'For me, Test cricket embodies life – you give your best, and if things go wrong, it gives you anoth-er day to regroup, think, unlearn, and bounce back," Tendulkar said.

'It is the highest form of the game that teaches you endurance, discipline and adaptability, against all odds. I owe my foundation to

Pant shares India's batting line-up change for England Tests

As India prepares for the crucial Test series against England, newly appointed vice-captain Rishabh Pant has affirmed a significant change in the team's batting order for the first Test, revealing that Shubman Gill will take up the No.4 spot, while Pant himself will bat at No.5.

"I think there is still discussion going on, who is going to play No.3. But definitely No.4 and No.5 are fixed." Pant began

are fixed," Pant began.

"I think Shubman is going to bat at No.4 and I'm going to stick to No.5 as of now. And rest, we are

going to keep on discussing about that," he said.

This change signals a major reshuffle in India's top order, triggered by the double retirements of Virat Kohli and Rohit Sharma. Shubman Gill, who began his career as an opener and was later moved to No.3, will now take up the No.4 position alongwith the re-



sponsibility of filling a massive void left by Kohli.

The No.3 position, however, remains up for grabs wherein Sai Sudharsan is considered a strong contender for the spot, alongwith the returning batter Karun Nair. Both the players have been in outstanding form leading up to the red-ball series against England, making the selection an intriguing decision for the team manage-

India have picked a young squad led by a new Test captain and will be without the experience of Virat Kohli, Rohit Sharma and Ravichandran Ashwin. This would be the first time since 2011 when India will play a Test match without at least one of those three stalwarts being present, an ICC report

"Obviously, it's a new start for us, big people have left. Yes, there will be a gap, but at the same time, it's an opportunity for us to build a new culture from here or take a culture forward from there, just adding to it," said Pant, acknowledging the gap in experience.

"I think being in a great frame of mind, helping the new players to learn and improve themselves in overseas conditions and sharing knowledge with each other, having that care and love in the dressing room for each other — that is something we are looking forward

It is still early days in Gill's Test career, with 1893 runs at a 35.05 average in 32 matches, since making his debut in December 2020.

With English conditions known for testing even the most seasoned of cricketers, Gill's leadership debut will be one to look out for, especially in the absence of veterans Rohit Sharma and Virat

Kohli, who announced their retirement last month. The side have also not won a Test series in England

India brace for Bazball storm in Leeds Test

Leeds: India's new Test captain Shubman Gill will lead a young and evolving side into a stern trial by fire as the test series gets underway against England at Leeds on Friday, marking the start of the ICC World Test Championship 2025–27 cycle for both teams.

Gill's first assignment as skipper comes against a confident England outfit helmed by Ben Stokes, whose team has embraced the aggressive 'Bazball' style in recent years.

England begin the series as firm favourites on home soil, particularly at Headingley, where they have won 34 out of 81 Tests. The venue is known to favour teams batting second, adding weight to the toss. India's young squad, full of potential but short on recent experience in English conditions, will depend heavily on its pace unit to make inroads.

Pathum Nissanka ton leads Lanka fightback

Partnerships were the cornerstone of Sri Lanka's strong reply on Day 3 of the opening Test against Bangladesh, as Pathum Nissanka's sublime careerbest 187 guided the hosts to 368/4 at stumps, trimming the first-innings deficit to just 127 runs.

The Lankan innings, built around Nissanka's authoritative knock, was a calculated counter to Bangladesh's imposing 495. The 26-year-old righthander dominated from the moment he walked in, showcasing a full range of strokes en route to his maiden Test century at home, and second overall.

Nissanka, who fell late in the day to the second new ball after a 256-ball masterclass, was involved in four key partnerships - 47 with debutant Lahiru Udara (29), 157 with Dinesh Chandimal (59), 89 with Angelo Mathews (39), and 38 with Kamindu Mendis (22 not out). Each stand



steadily chipped away at the Bangladesh lead while maintaining a brisk scoring rate of around four runs

His dismissal — bowled through the gate by a sharp inducker from Hasan Mahmud — gave Bangladesh a late spark of hope, after a demoralising day in the field. Mahmud, Taijul Islam, Nayeem Hasan, and part-timer Mominul Haque shared the wickets, but the attack struggled for control on a pitch offering occasional turn and variable bounce.

Earlier in the morning, Sri Lanka needed just 15 minutes to wrap up the Bangladesh innings. Asitha Fernando claimed the final scalp to finish with 4 for 86, preventing the visitors from stretching their overnight total.

Bangladesh's bowling, however, lacked the bite shown by their bats men over the first two days. In con trast to Bangladesh's methodical crawl at just over three an over, Sri Lanka's batsmen played with positive intent, frequently shifting pressure back onto the bowlers. Nissanka's ability to counterattack with controlled aggression ensured no breakthrough led to a collapse.

Dinesh Chandimal contributed a fluent half-century — his 33rd in Tests using deft late cuts and drives while Mathews was shaping well be fore Mominul produced a rare unplayable delivery to have him caught

But aside from this, you just need to be happy in what you're doing, and the rest is just a bonus," Bellandi said.
