# MP unveils new public service promotion rules 2025

**Bhopal:** Just one day after a pivotal cabinet decision, the Madhya Pradesh government has officially released the Public Service Promotion Rules-2025, signaling a serious have been stalled for the past nine years. The new regulations maintain reservation provisions for promotions mirroring those applied to direct recruitment. This means Scheduled Tribes (ST) government employees will receive 20% reservation in vacant promotion posts, while Scheduled Castes (SC) will get 16%. Remaining promotions will go to the unreserved category, but the promotion process for recompleted first.

The General Administration Department's notification frankly admits that the nine-year freeze on promotions has severely impacted efficiency and morale. Many eligible government employees have retired without receiving due promotions, affecting both state government functionality and employee morale. With this notification, the new rules are now in effect, allowing departments to initiate promotion processes.

#### **Key bases for promotion** under new rules

- Promotions to Class I posts will be based on merit-cum-seniority.
- For other posts, promotions will consider seniority combined with suitability
- The overall vacant posts for promotion will reserve 20% for ST and 16% for SC, effectively maintaining the previous reservation

#### Departmental promotion committees to be formed

Dedicated Departmental Promotion Committees (DPCs) will be constituted in all departments to



The departmental secretary will chair these committees, with the head of the department serving as secretary. Each committee will also include a GAD officer, not below the rank of Deputy Secretary.

If a departmental committee reaches a differing decision in any case, a special committee headed by the Chief Secretary, including the departmental secretary and

committees will have a tenure from 2024 to 2028, with changes possible after five years. Their primary responsibility will be to oversee pro-

#### Annual DPC meetings and disqualification for penalties

The new rules mandate that DPC meetings for each cadre's promotions will be held at least once a

year. A special DPC meeting will convene after the rules are implemented to address promotion vacancies up to December 31, 2025. Subsequently, annual DPC meetings will be held between September and November to consider promotions for posts becoming vacant by December 31st of that year. Significantly, the GAD's new

rules also stipulate that any government employee against whom disciplinary action has been taken and a penalty imposed will be deemed ineligible for promotion.

### Potential benefits: Over 4 lakh employees could gain

Promotions in the state have been on hold since 2016. With the cabinet's recent decision and the release of these new rules, the path to promotion could open for over 4 lakh government employees if the rules avoid further legal entanglement. This surge in promotions will create vacancies at lower levels, potentially leading to approximately 2 can then begin to fill. ## CM to engage with cow herders & cow shelter operators today

**Bhopal:** Chief Minister Dr. Mohan Yadav is set to interact with cow herders and gaushala (cow shelter) operators across Madhya Pradesh at his official residence on June 20th. During this significant "Gaushala Conference," scheduled for 12 PM, the Chief Minister will also disburse approximately Rs 90 crore in financial aids to gaushalas. State Minister for Animal Husbandry and Dairy Development (Independent Charge), Lakhan Patel, will also be present. The conference will see participation from representatives and operators of both government and private gaushalas from all districts of the state. Uma Kant Umrao, Principal Secretary of Animal Husbandry and Dairy, announced that the state government has increased the financial grant for registered gaushalas from Rs 20 per cow per day to Rs 40 per cow per day for the proper upkeep of cat-tle. Accordingly, the installment of

approximately Rs 90 crore, covering the grant for cows maintained in gaushalas for April and May 2025, will be released during the conference.

The event will also feature the presentation of Gau-Seva Awards to selected gaushalas and organizations under the Acharya Vidyasagar Jeev Dava Gau-Seva Samman Yojana. The first prize will be Rs 5 lakh, the second Rs 3 lakh, the third Rs 2 lakh, and consolation prizes of Rs 50,000 each will be awarded. Individuals demonstrating outstanding work in cow welfare will receive a first prize of Rs 1 lakh, a second prize of Rs 50,000, and a third prize of Rs 20,000.

Indore: The Shillong Police, meticulously working to unravel the complexities of the Raja Raghuvanshi murder case have now broadened their investigation, becoming increasingly active in Indore. On Thursday, a police team meticulously interrogated three employees associated with Sonam Raghuvanshi at the Indore Crime Branch police station. Among them were two young women who were in close contact with Sonam and possessed vital information related to her professional activities in Indore.

According to sources, the interrogation delved into Sonam's daily routine, her meetings, and her general demeanor. The investigation's primary focus was to ascertain if these em-

ployees had ever observed any abnormalities in Sonam's activities or relationships. The women were also questioned about any pre-existing tensions they might have noticed be-

tween Sonam and the deceased, Raj

The driver confirmed that police sought details about the vehi cle and the journey. "The police only car and the travel on that day," the driver stated, "I have provided them with all the information clearly.' This intensified police action

Police are feaving no stone unturned in examining Sonam's contacts, travel details, and the roles of her associates. # Ambedkar statue row deepens in Gwalior High Court

## Delegation meets CM Yadav, demands 27% OBC reservation

Gwalior: The ongoing controversy surrounding the installation of an Ambedkar statue within the Gwalior High Court premises is intensifying. Ĭn a significant development, a delegation advocating for the statue's placement met with Chief Minister Dr. Mohan Yadav at Gwalior Airport. During the meeting, they also submitted a memorandum urging the implementa-tion of 27% OBC reservation in Madhya Pradesh and the immediate release of the currently withheld 13% OBC reservation.

The demand for Baba Saheb Bhimrao Ambedkar's statue in the Gwalior High Court campus has been a subject of discussion for several months, escalating into a full-blown dispute and creating considerable tension. Consequently, a pro-statue delegation, led by Advocate Dharmendra



Kushwah, sought an audience with Chief Minister Dr. Mohan Yadav at the Gwalior Airport. They urged the CM to issue swift directives for the statue's installation.

Advocate Vishwajit Ratonia, commenting on the statue controversy, stated that they had a fruitful meeting with the Chief Minister, providing him with comprehensive information and submitting their memorandum. They implored the Chief Minister for direct intervention from the Madhya Pradesh government to expedite the stat-ue's installation and resolve the escalating dispute in Gwalior. Chief Minister Yadav reportedly assured them that the entire matter is under his close scrutiny and that necessary steps would be taken soon.

clared 'Red Fly Zones. According to official sources, the operation of drones in these sensitive areas is now strictly prohibited without explicit permission from the designated authority, the Sub-Divisional Magistrate. Mandla: Startling revelations emerging from Jhingra Tola, Umartala Gram Panchayat, under Bichhia Block in Mandla district, during the Jan Sangharsh Morcha's Jan Swabhiman Yatra, have sent shockwaves across the region. Villagers have made grave accusations, claiming that the Kanha Tiger Reserve forest staff is relentlessly persecuting Baiga tribals, with women and children now becoming targets.

## Infant snatched, grandfather beaten: A horrifying account

In the early morning of June 4th and 5th, Mangal Baiga had gone to the riverside with his 8month-old granddaughter, Pragya, to brush their teeth. Suddenly, a team of 25-30 forest department constables raided the area. They allegedly forcibly snatched the infant from her foster mother, Gautharin Bai. Mangal was then seized and taken to the Mahua Dabri checkpoint, where he was reportedly beaten at the Sarhi Gate. Furthermore, it is alleged that attempts were made to coerce a false confession from Mangal regarding the deaths of wild animals.

## Katku Baiga vanishes: "Taken to the Jungle after being plying with alcohol"

On June 6th, Katku Baiga, while returning to his village, was allegedly abducted by forest personnel. Local villagers claim he was plied with al-



spair; Katku, a father of four, is missing, and his wife has no idea whether he has been imprisoned or has fallen victim to some other tragic fate.

The alleged brutality of the forest department is so severe that when the forest team came searching for Ajay Baiga of Jhingra Tola, he chose to flee the village to save his life. The entire village remains gripped by fear after Girani Baiga was reportedly surrounded on June 10th.

These distressing incidents were brought to light on June 18th during the Jan Swabhiman Yatra in Anjania, where a memorandum detailing the atrocities was submitted to the Naib Tehsildar,
