# Nirmal Narmada Mission launched to cleanse lifeline river

Centre's full support will be sought: Vijayvargiya

**Bhopal:** Urban Development and Housing Minister Kailash Vijay-vargiya has affirmed the Madhya Pradesh government's unwavering commitment to preserving the sanctity of the Narmada River, call-ing it the lifeline of the state. In a high-level review meeting held at the Mantralaya on Monday, he emphasized that every possible assistance will be sought from the Central Government under the National River Conservation Plan to ensure the success of the ambitious 'Nirmal Narmada' project.

The first phase of the project is being initiated with an estimated cost of Rs 2,459 crore. Officials from the Urban Development Company participated in the meeting. The Minister directed them to carry out comprehensive field surveys before starting project implementation. He underlined the urgency of completing all sewage treatment plants (STPs) in



riverfront cities within the specified timeframe.

Vijayvargiya stressed the importance of interdepartmental coordi-nation, particularly with Rural De-

velopment, Water Resources, and Narmada Valley Development departments, to ensure effective execution. He also ordered that untreated industrial waste must not

be allowed to enter the river and called for the treatment of existing contaminated water.

#### Focus on areas surrounding Narmada Parikrama route

Special attention will be given to the areas surrounding the Narmada Parikrama pilgrimage route, where a survey of existing and under-construction STPs will be undertaken. The Minister also instructed that religious sites near the river be surveyed and included in the project, with provisions for STPs and potential tourism devel-opment. Urban Development Commissioner Sanket Bhondve said the plan, aligned with the 2025 vision, aims to connect maximum households to STPs in cities along the river. The river stretches 1,077 km in Madhya Pradesh, impacting 54 urban and 818 rural settlements across 27 districts.

The project also includes largescale plantation drives by urban local bodies to restore and preserve the river ecosystem.



## Shukla reviews upgrades in medical colleges

**Bhopal:** Deputy Chief Minister Ra-jendra Shukla chaired a high-level meeting at the Secretariat to review the proposed establishment of new medical departments in various government medical colleges across MP. He directed officials to ensure timely availability of resources and expert medical staff, particularly for the pro-posed Onco Surgery Departments in identified colleges. Shukla empha-sized expediting the procedural work for establishing the Cardiothoracic and Vascular Surgery (CTVS) Depart-ment at Gwalior Medical College. He also stressed the need to give top pri-ority to the completion of the Pedi-

atric Medicine and Neonatology Department at Indore Medical College To address the shortage of nursing staff, the Deputy CM instructed officials to send a recruitment requisition to the Staff Selection Board by amending necessary rules, enabling direct recruitment of nurses.

He also reviewed the progress of Cath Lab installations in medical colleges and called for prioritizing this work to facilitate treatment for heart patients. Additionally, Shukla direct-ed for the timely procurement of advanced medical equipment, ensuring all necessary formalities are completed without delay.

### Road repairs begin after minister's AIIMS Bhopal launches training program for emergency preparedness directive, pothole crisis in Bhopal

Bhopal: Due to continuous rain, the condition of roads in Bhopal has deteriorated severely, with potholes ranging from one to one and a half feet deep emerging across several areas. Responding to pub-lic complaints, PWD officers have initiated urgent repair works.

Following the instructions of PWD Minister Rakesh Singh, Engineer-in-Chief K.P.S. Rana and Bhopal Circle Chief Engineer Sanjay Maske inspected roads across five city divisions on Monday. The inspection revealed multiple damaged stretches, prompting immediate repair action. From Tuesday, pothole repairs began in critical areas like in front of the BJP ffice and Rani Kamlapati Railway Sta-

In front of the BJP office on Hoshangabad Road, about 10 to 15 feet of

road was severely damaged, with similar conditions at nearby turns. The potholes posed significant risks-two-wheelers were skidding and four-wheelers suffering damage. As a result, paver blocks were laid to ensure durable repairs and prevent further potholes. This repair activity also disrupted traffic flow temporarily.

Additionally, paver blocks were installed in waterlogged zones such as Number 10 and Karond Mandi. Roads from Sindhi Colony to Bairasia Road and Jawahar Chowk to Bhadbhada will now be maintained by the Metro Corporation. Chief En-gineer Maske assured that all city road re-pairs will be completed by July 20.

**Bhopal:** Under the guidance of Prof. (Dr.) Ajai Singh, Executive Director of AIIMS Bhopal, a six-day training program titled "Ca-pacity Building of Hospital Ad-ministrative Officers for Health Emergencies" began at the institute. emergencies test the entire hospital system — not just the clinical side. He underlined the importance of interdepartmental coordination, hands-on prac-tice, and regular mock drills stating that "the real test of training lies in field implementation.

The Associate Dean (Academics) shared practical insights, referencing the Odisha train tragedy to highlight the impor-tance of swift decision-making and inter agency coordination and inter-agency coordination in crisis situations.

### Additional CLC phase from July 16 to 31 For UG and NCTE course admissions in colleges

**Bhopal:** The Higher Education Department has announced an additional College Level Counseling (CLC) phase for undergraduate admissions for the academic session 2025–26. This phase will run from July 16 to 31 and will apply to government, grant-in-aid, and private non-government colleges across the state.

During this period, college-wise vacant seats will be updated daily on the official admission portal starting from July 16. Students can directly visit the respective colleges for admission to these vacant seats. Registrations and option selection will be open daily until 3 PM, while applica-tions received by 4 PM will be verified. A merit list will be issued by 5 PM the same day.

Students are required to de-posit the admission fee within 24 hours of the merit list's release. Failure to do so will cancel their admission, and they will need to reapply.

To log in, subscribers need to enter their series, account number, and password. This move aims to enhance transparency and save time for GPF account holders.

Online grievance redressal also available: In case of any discrepancies or errors in the GPF statement, subscribers can lodge complaints through the online grievance re-dressal system.



Bhopal: "One who thinks big has no enmity or opposition," said Muni Shri Praman Sagar Maharaj while ad-dressing a gathering at Vidya Praman Gurukulam, Avadhpuri. A sign of jealousy, he said, is being unable to accept someone else's success or praise. Instead of drawing inspiration from others' progress, people often question their competence or accuse them of favoritism—clear symptoms of jealousy.

Muni Shri stressed that instead of blaming others or circumstances, one should strive to enhance personal capa-bilities. He warned that jealousy not only disrupts inner peace but also destroys mutual trust and harmony. He also spoke against egoism, intolerance, and a negative mindset that searches for faults even in good. Concluding his address, he recalled his Gurudev's words: "The one who thinks big, holds no enmity or rivalry in his heart.'
