9,500 schools still without electricity

Patwari writes a letter to CM



Bhopal: In a scathing indictment of Madhya Pradesh's declining education standards, State Congress President Jitu Patwari has penned a strongly worded letter to Chief Minister Dr. Mohan Yadav, demanding imme-

diate intervention. Patwari, citing a recent central government report,

described the state's education system as "appalling and concerning." He highlighted alarming statistics from the Unified District Information System for Edu-cation (UDISE) 2023-24 report, managed under the Union Ministry of Education.

The report reveals a shocking reality: nearly 9,500 government schools across Madhya Pradesh still lack basic amenities like electricity. Furthermore, over 12,000 schools are being run by a single teacher, shouldering the entire burden of educating multiple classes.

Patwari questioned the state government's priorities, asking: "When the government possesses ade-quate budget and administrative infrastructure, why are children being deprived of minimum facilities such as electricity, teachers, furniture, and toilets?

He urged the Chief Minister to address the UDISE report with utmost seriousness in the upcoming assembly session. Additionally, Patwari called for an independent agency to investigate the utilization and potential misuse of the education budget to ensure accountability.

Bhopal: A tragic incident occurred on Wednesday night in Bhopal's Bagh Sewania area, where a 29-year-old woman from Vidishe Surabbi took har gur Vidisha, Surabhi, took her own

life by hanging. She was staying at the residence of her paternal uncle (father's elder brother) in Vidya Nagar, C-Sector, as a guest when the incident happened.

According to SI Bharat Singh Meena of the Bagh Sewania Police Station, Surabhi was the daughter of Rajkumar and origidaughter of Rajkumär and origi-nally belonged to Vidisha district. Her family often visited Bhopal, where her grandfather resides. On the day of the incident, Surabhi was alone at home. Her mother applyed in a private

mother, employed in a private job, and her brother Vivek, who works as a taxi driver, had both gone to work.

Her cousin had also accompa-nied her brother, leaving Surabhi

Crime Branch nabs wanted mother-son duo in Ganja smuggling



Bhopal: The Bhopal Crime Branch has successfully arrested a mother-son duo—Kiran Ahirwar (55) and her son Monu Ahirwar (30)—who had been on the run in a major ganja smuggling case. Both had a Rs 5,000 reward on

their heads and were wanted by the Crime Branch and multiple police stations in the city. According to officials, the two were involved in trafficking ganja from Odisha and distributing it across Bhopal.

They had managed to evade arrest for months despite being key accused in a Narcotic Drugs case registered under the Crime Branch's NTPS unit.

Acting on a tip-off, a team led by Additional DCP Shailendra Singh Chauhan laid a trap and arrested the duo from beneath the Subhash Nagai underbridge. After the arrest, the accused were produced in court and subsequently remanded to judicial custody. Both Kiran and Monu Ahirwar have multiple cases registered against them, making this arrest a sig-nificant breakthrough in Bhopal's on-going crackdown on narcotics networks. The Crime Branch continues its focused efforts to dismantle drug supply chains and bring long-absconding criminals to justice.

Woman killed as Bolero rams Chaos on Kolar six-lane road bike in Danishkunj ates significant inconvenience for local shopkeepers on both

Illegal parking cripples traffic flow



Bhopal: The much-touted Kolar six-lane road, built at a cost of approximately Rs 222 crore, is proving to be a monumental fail-ure when it comes to traffic management. Illegal parking on both sides of the thoroughfare is creating daily gridlock, turning what should be a smooth commute into a frustrating crawl. From mid-day into late evening, during peak hours, four-wheelers are rou-tinely parked for hours along the roadside, causing massive traf-fic jams. This chaotic parking not only snarls traffic but also cre-

sides of the road.

Six-lane becomes two-lane" due to driver disregard

Local shopkeepers lament that due to improper parking, the six-lane road effectively shrinks to a mere two or three lanes. Adding to the congestion, stray cattle frequently wander onto the main road, further intensifying the traffic pressure.

"If drivers showed more sense, this problem wouldn't be so massive," an anonymous local commented. "Most drivers ignore the designated parking spots, and that's why the problem per-Sandeep Ahirwar, a resident of Bima Kunj, highlighted that this issue plagues the entire stretch from Kolar Square to Bairagarh Chichli. In the late evenings, even street vendors set up their stalls directly on the main road, flouting regulations. Commuter Abhishek Singh expressed frustration, stating, "Kolar has a six-lane, but people lack awareness." Jitendra Vyas, a driver, added that this negligence often leads to accidents. "Because no action is taken, many four- and three-wheeler drivers continue to act irresponsibly.

Executive Director Prof. (Dr.) Ajai Singh emphasized the trans-formative potential of these services stating, "The loss of a limb changes lives, but with proper rehabilitation, individuals can reintegrate into society with dignity and confidence."
