# Test tons hard to get: Broad on handshake drama

A rare postscript of tension un-folded at The Old Trafford on the final evening of the fourth India-England Test, when Indian batsmen Ravindra Jadeja and Washington Sundar declined Ben Stokes' offer to draw the match, choosing instead to chase personal milestones. The moment triggered visible frustration from the England camp, but former pacer Stuart Broad defended the move, stating, "Test hundreds are bloody hard to

With India reaching 430 for four and the match heading inexorably toward a draw, England captain Ben Stokes signaled the customary handshake at the start of the final hour. Having already spent 143 overs in the field, England sought closure. However, Jadeja and Sundar opted to bat on, well within the laws, to try and complete their well-earned centuries.

What followed was an unusual phase of Test cricket. With all hopes of a result gone, part-timer Harry Brook was summoned to bowl off-spin—despite being a medium pacer. The bowling lacked intensity, and the field closed in as England players tried to hurry pro-



"There was frustration, sure," said Broad during post-match commentary. "But Sundar was on the brink of a maiden hundred, Jadeja was close too. They've been out there grinding for four hours. You can't blame them. Test hundreds are bloody hard to get."

As Brook delivered wayward offspin, India cautiously pushed singles, with Jadeja even launching a six. On more than one occasion, England players, Brook included offered handshakes, only to be

Broad empathised with the situation on both sides. "If I was fielding, I'd be taking my boots off near the dressing room, ready to go in. But I can't fault India either. That was four hours of serious determination.'

Sundar's emotions after the match struck a chord. "He said this was for his family," Broad recounted. "That hit me. The work wasn't in the final 50 minutes. It was in the four hours they dug in to save

#### Gambhir in heated exchange with Oval Groundsman

India's build-up to the final Test at The Oval took an unexpected turn when head coach Gautam Gambhir was seen involved in a heated exchange with Lee Fortis, the head groundsman at Surrey. The incident, which unfolded during today's optional training session, cast an uneasy shadow over what was expected to be a routine practice ahead of the high-stakes

Eyewitnesses described Gambhir wagging his finger at Fortis in what appeared to be an animated disagreement.

Reportedly, the dispute stemmed from his objections to India using parts of the main square for warm-ups and drills. Groundsmen are traditionally protective of the square, and with The Oval set to host more domestic matches through early September, Fortis was reportedly anxious to limit traffic around the

India's assistant coach Sitanshu Kotak confirmed tensions on the



ground, admitting that the team felt "awkward" after being instructed to maintain a 2.5-metre distance from the pitch, despite not wearing spikes.

"When some of us coaches went to see the wicket, a member of the groundstaff said stay away at least 2.5 metres, which was a little surprising," Kotak said. "Because it is the pitch, the match is starting day after, it will be a fiveday Test, and we're standing in our joggers, so we felt a little awk-

Kotak did not directly comment on the Gambhir-Fortis confrontation but defended the team's conduct. "(We were) just looking at

the wicket, with rubber spikes. There's nothing wrong with that. Curators also need to understand the people they are talking to, they are highly skilled and intelligent," he said. "For example, if you go on the ground now where we proceed." the ground now where we practised, you won't even see that any bowler in the outfield would have marked it with his spikes. That all comes from the head coach. We try and see this ground also doesn't get damaged."

The assistant coach suggested

that the tone of communication may have triggered the episode. "You can be protective, but at the end of the day it is a cricket pitch, not an antique. We were standing there with rubber spikes. You tell me — a day after, a batsman will be sliding to survive a run-out, a bowler will be sliding to stop the ball. Maybe he (Fortis) is thinking we are trying to grow the grass. mean, I don't know. He said that we are trying to get this grass on the next wicket to the centre wicket. I don't know how much grass will grow in one day.'

#### Katie Ledecky wins 1500m gold at World Aquatics



USA swimming great Katie Ledecky clinched her first gold medal and 22nd world title at the 2025 World Aquatics Championships, dominating the women's 1500m freestyle final on Day 3 of

the meet here today.

After settling for bronze in the 400m freestyle on Day 1, the nine-time Olympic champion returned to familiar territory in the distance event, leading from start to finish in front of IOC President Kirsty Coventry and IOC Honorary President dent Thomas Bach.

The day's most anticipated duel saw Australia's Kaylee McKeown outpace American Regan Smith to win the women's 100m backstroke. The reigning double Olympic champion stopped the clock ahead of world record holder Smith, who took silver in a thrilling contest.

In the men's 200m freestyle final, David Popovici of Romania showcased his class once again, capturing the crown to add to his Olympic gold from Paris 2024.

South Africa's Pieter Coetze triumphed in the men's 100m backstroke final, grabbing his first senior world title.

In the night's biggest upset, Germany's Anna Elendt stormed to victory in the women's 100m breaststroke, edging out USA's Kate Douglass, the Olympic 200m breaststroke champion from

Earlier in the day, USA's Bobby Finke advanced to the men's 800m freestyle final alongside top contenders Lukas Märtens of Germany and Daniel Wiffen of Ireland — the latter still recovering from recent appendicitis surgery.

## Australia sweep Caribbean tour 8-0 across format

Australia wrapped up their Caribbean tour in dominant fashion, sealing a clean sweep across formats with a thrilling 3-wicket win over West Indies in the fifth and final

The result ensured a comprehensive 8-0 scoreline for the visitors, following a 3-0 Test series sweep and a

5-0 rout in the T20Is.
Chasing 171, Australia overcame
a shaky start to reach 173/7 with three overs to spare, thanks to another impactful display by their middle order led by Mitchell Owen (37), Tim David and Cameron Green. For his consistent all-round performances throughout the T20I series, Green was named Player of the Se-

Earlier, West Indies, opting to bat, were bowled out for 170 in 19.4 overs despite a brisk 30-ball 52 from Shimron Hetmyer. Returning left-arm seamer Ben Dwarshuis impressed with figures of 3 for 41, removing both openers early and breaking partnerships at crucial junctures.

Sherfane Rutherford provided early impetus with a quickfire 35 but was bowled by Glenn Maxwell against the run of play. Hetmyer's



counterattack, including a 17th over assault on Dwarshuis, briefly lifted West Indies' hopes, but his dismissal immediately after his fifty led to a late collapse, with the hosts managing only 14 runs in the final three

In reply, Australia were rocked early by Alzarri Joseph and Akeal Ho-sein as they slipped to 25/3, with Maxwell falling for a golden duck. But Tim David, returning after a rest, turned the momentum with a flurry of sixes before falling for a brisk cameo. Owen and Green main-tained the tempo with aggressive strokeplay before Hosein struck

twice more to keep West Indies in the hunt.

Despite those blows, Aaron Hardie held firm to guide Australia home, staying unbeaten to finish the match with 18 balls to spare. Hosein's 3/17 stood out for the West Indies in an otherwise forgettable

yesterday. With this win, she became the first Indian woman to win the FIDE women's world cup and only the fourth Indian player to attain the Grandmaster title.

### McKeown outswims Smith to defend 100m backstroke world title

Singapore (UNI) Australia's Kaylee McKeown reaffirmed her dominance in women's backstroke by edging out arch-rival Regan Smith in the 100m backstroke title at the 2025 World Aquatics Championships.

Competing under the lights in Singapore, the two-time Olympic champion surged past Smith in the final stretch to clock a championship-record 57.16 seconds — a stun-



ning comeback after trailing by 0.22 seconds at the halfway mark. World record-holder Smith of the United States settled for silver onds, while fellow American Katharine Berkoff touched home in 58.15 to take bronze.

The triumph marked a successful title defence for McKeown, who had won the same event at the 2023 World Championships in Fukuoka.



#### Satwik-Chirag cruise into Macau Open pre-quarters

Macau (UNI) Asian Games gold medallists Satwiksairaj Rankireddy and Chirag Shetty breezed into the men's doubles prequarterfinals at the Macau Open 2025 badminton tournament with a straight-games win here today.

Competing at the Macao East Asian Games Dome in Macau, China, the Indian pair dispatched Malaysia's Low Hang Yee and Ng Eng Cheong 21-13, 21-15 in a dominant performance.

However, it was a mixed day for India in women's doubles. Top seeds and Commonwealth Games bronze medallists Treesa Jolly and Gayatri Gopichand suffered a shock first-round exit, going down 16-21, 22-20, 21-15 to the unseeded Chinese Taipei duo of Lin Xiao-Min and

who sustained the injury while fielding during a domestic T20 game in England, has not recovered sufficiently to be part of the playing XI. However, he will remain with the squad in Zimbabwe, with the hope of regaining fitness ahead of the second Test.

Head coach Rob Walter expressed disappointment over

#### Hope eyes Pakistan Test after 5-0 Aussie drubbing

Bridgetown: West Indies skipper Shai Hope has called for a reset after his team endured a 5-0 T20I series whitewash at the hands of a dominant Australian side, pointing to inconsistency in the batting department as a major factor in the team's

Reflecting on the series, Hope said, "I just didn't think we put together a proper batting display. We either started well and finished poorly or the other way around. When you're playing against quality opposition like Australia, you've got to put things together for a more complete game.

Throughout the series, West Indies repeatedly squandered promising starts. In the first match, they were cruising at 123 for 1 in the 13th over but could only reach 189. A strong opening in the second game – 63 for no loss – similarly fizzled out with a final total of 172.

Peng Yu-Wei. Priya Konjengbam and Shruti Mishra kept Indian hopes alive by edging past Chinese Taipei's Ling Zih Huang and Wang Szu-Min 21-15, 16-21, 21-17 in a tightly-contested clash that lasted one hour and nine minutes. ## 134th Durand cup to begin today in Manipur

The 134th Durand Cup, 2025, will begin today at the Khuman Lampak Main Stadium in Imphal, organized by the Indian Army and the Department of Youth Affairs & Sports

(YAS), Government of Manipur. The Manipur Police has announced special traffic arrangements around the stadium starting

Dr. Mayengbam Veto Singh, Director of Youth Affairs & Sports, Government of Manipur, stated that the 134th edition of the Durand Cup will be the first major sporting event in the state since the COVID-19

He said six matches will be host-

ed in Manipur during the tournament, scheduled for July 30, August 1, 4, 7, 10, with the final match on August 12. Four teams will compete in the Imphal leg of the tournament — Real Kashmir FC and the Indian Navy Football Team from outside the state, and local teams NEROCA

FC and TRAU FC. On July 10, Imphal warmly welcomed the 134th edition of the Indian Oil Durand Cup with a grand trophy tour, marking the return of Asia's oldest football tournament to the Manipur capital after a two-year hiatus. The three iconic trophies the Durand Cup, the Shimla Trophy, and the President's Cup — were formally unveiled.

## Football India women's team clubbed with best Asian teams

The Indian women's football team has been drawn into a formidable Group C alongside continental heavyweights Japan, Vietnam and Chinese Taipei for the AFC Women's Asian Cup 2026, to be held in Australia from March 1 to 21.

The draw ceremony, conducted at the Sydney Town Hall, saw Indian midfielder Sangita Basfore, who netted twice in India's final qualifier against Thailand, serve as one of the three draw assistants, along with Australia's Tameka Yallop and Korea Republic's Jeon

Yu-gyeong.
Placed in Pot 4 prior to



the draw, based on the latest FIFA rankings released on June 12, India (world No. 70) face a daunting group stage. Japan, Asia's highest-ranked team at world No. 7, are joined by Vietnam (No. 37)

and Chinese Taipei (No. 42) in Group C.

Twelve teams have been split into three groups of four for the group stage of the 21st edition of Asia's premier women's football tour-

nament, the oldest of its kind on the continent. The top two teams from each group and the two best third-placed sides will qualify for the quarterfinals.

India booked their spot in the tournament by top-ping Group B in the AFC Women's Asian Cup Qualifiers, registering victories over Thailand, Iraq, Timor-Leste and Mongolia.

This will mark India's first full-fledged appearance in the tournament since 2003. The Blue Tigresses did feature in the 2022 edition as hosts but were forced to withdraw following a COVID-19 outbreak in the squad.

Historically, India's bes performances in the tour nament came in the early 1980s, when they finished runners-up in 1980 and 1983, and secured a thirdplace finish in 1981.

Australia, as hosts, and the top three teams from the 2022 edition — China, South Korea and Japan received automatic qualifi-

The 2026 tournament will be hosted across three cities — Sydney, Perth and Gold Coast. Defending champions China, who have won a record nine titles, will look to extend their dominance on the continental stage.
