

London NRI family assaulted by police in Bhind

Constable accused of orchestrating attack

An NRI couple from London, Dr. Vikramjit Singh and his wife Rajveer Kaur, along with their children, were attacked while traveling to Gohad in Bhind district. The incident occurred when their car was assaulted by miscreants wielding sticks, resulting in injuries to their son, Rohanpreet Singh and daughter, Ravneet Kaur. The attackers also damaged the car's side glass and window.

Accused constable line attached

Members of the Sikh community have accused constable Kuldeep Kushwaha, stationed at Gohad Chauraha police station, of orchestrating the attack. They have demanded the registration of a First Information Report (FIR) against him. In response to the escalating situation,



Bhind Superintendent of Police Asit Yadav took action by removing the constable from his post and assigning him to the line. The family has also lodged a complaint with the Indian Embassy regarding the incident.

Family had returned to India after two and a half years

The family had returned to India after two and a half years to visit Dr. Vikramjit's in-laws. The trouble began when the couple parked their car to buy fruits near the Gohad town station. Allegedly, the constable approached them in civilian clothes, leading to a confrontation over his identity. Following their refusal to acknowledge him as a police officer, the family was attacked while leaving for their in-laws' house, raising serious concerns about safety and police conduct in the area.

Man dies after snakebite in shahdol

Could not get Ambulance and timely treatment

Shahdol: A tragic example of the lack of health infrastructure in tribal areas has surfaced, highlighting a system that failed a vulnerable family. Babru Baiga, a resident of Ghogri village in the Budhar sub-district, died after a venomous snakebite because he couldn't get a timely ambulance or medical treatment.

The incident occurred late last night while Baiga was sleeping. When his family discovered he had been bitten, they panicked and made continuous calls to the 108 ambulance service for hours, but no help arrived. Desperate, they called the 100-dial police service. A police team eventually reached their home and took Baiga to the Jaitpur Health Center.

A fatal delay

Family members said that while a doctor was present at the health center, there was still no



ambulance available to transfer him to a larger hospital. His condition was worsening, but despite their repeated pleas, the government system remained silent. With no other option, the impoverished family was forced to hire a private vehicle for Rs 2,500 to take him to the Shahdol district hospital. However, it was too late. Baiga died on the way.

Calls for accountability

Grieving relatives and local

villagers believe that Baiga's life could have been saved with prompt medical attention and a functioning ambulance service. They are now accusing the government of making empty promises, pointing out that while the administration claims to spend millions on tribal communities like the Baiga, these services remain non-existent on the ground. This tragic death serves as a stark reminder of the gap between policy and reality.

5 held planning to rob passenger bus



Jabalpur: The police have achieved a significant success in Jabalpur, Madhya Pradesh, by arresting five miscreants before they could execute a robbery on a passenger bus. A large number of weapons were recovered from the accused.

The leader of the group, Sukku Lodhi, had conspired to rob passengers on the Jabalpur-Bhopal-Indore bus along with his

four accomplices. They were planning the robbery while seated in a car parked on Mahuakhara Road in the Patan police station area.

Upon receiving information, the police arrived at the scene and apprehended the suspects. The authorities seized a country-made pistol, four cartridges, a sword, a rod, and the car used in the incident from the accused.

New details emerge in Rs 15 crore bank heist in Jabalpur

Jabalpur: New details have come to light in the investigation of the sensational Rs 15 crore bank robbery in Jabalpur's Khitola area. Police have revealed that the perpetrators bought a new, unregistered motorcycle specifically for the daylight heist on August 11, abandoning it at the scene before fleeing.

Acting on CCTV footage, police are now searching for a key suspect named Raees, a Jabalpur resident. He has been on the run since the robbery, and he was reportedly seen with one of the accused before the incident. Investigators believe Raees may have been the local contact for the robbers, who are all thought to be from outside the area.

Robbers posed as finance workers

Further investigation revealed that the gang had been hiding in the village of Indrana in the Majholi police area for 20 days



leading up to the robbery. They had rented a house using fake Aadhaar cards and had been posing as employees of a finance

company to avoid suspicion.

Police are currently working to uncover the full extent of the gang's network and other possible

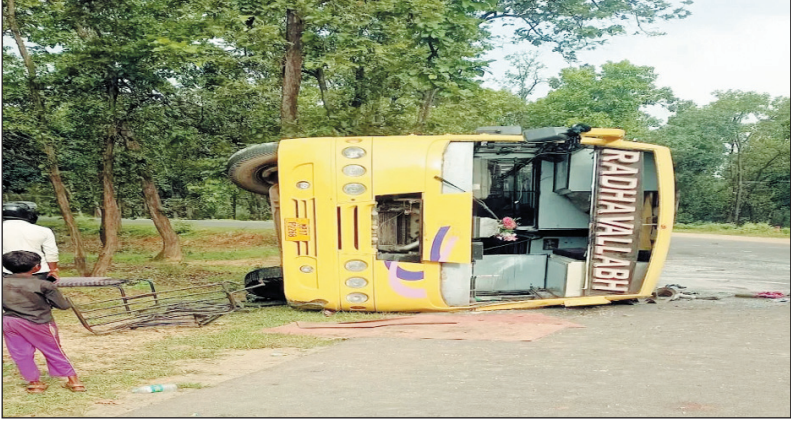
hideouts. The case has been full of surprising turns as authorities piece together the details of the highly coordinated crime.

Speeding bus overturns in Singrauli

Over a dozen seriously injured

Singrauli: A speeding passenger bus overturned late last night near the Singrauli-Sidhi border, injuring dozens and leaving more than a dozen critically hurt. The horrific accident occurred around 11 p.m. when the Radha Vallabh Travels bus, en route from Rewa to Baidhan, Singrauli, lost control and flipped over in a dense forest near the Tikri post.

The bus, carrying over 40 passengers, was thrown into chaos as it crashed. Survivors' screams filled the night, and rescuers rushed to the scene. More than a dozen passengers sustained serious injuries in the wreck. All the injured were immediately taken to the Sidhi District Hospital and Niwas Community Health



Center for treatment.

Fast driving suspected

Local police and administrative officials arrived swiftly to begin rescue operations. Preliminary

investigations suggest that the cause of the accident was excessive speed and reckless driving. Authorities are looking into the driver's actions leading up to the crash.

Notorious criminal killed by villagers in Jabalpur village

Jabalpur: Late Friday night in the village of Rithori, a violent confrontation resulted in the death of a notorious criminal, Rupendra Sahu, at the hands of local villagers. The incident stemmed from a longstanding rivalry, with Laxman Banjara and several accomplices seeking vengeance for an attack that occurred nearly 11 months prior. Rupendra Sahu, known for his criminal activities, had a long history with 28 registered cases against him, including charges of extortion, attempted murder, and threats.

DRI uncovers Rs 40 crore, bogus billing scam in Indore

Indore: The Mumbai unit of the Directorate of Revenue Intelligence (DRI) has busted a massive bogus billing racket in Indore, uncovering fraudulent transactions worth an estimated Rs 40 crore. The raid on Omkar Traders in the city's Siaganj area revealed that the firm was illegally importing dried dates from Pakistan via Dubai, using forged documents to make the goods appear legitimate.

Sources indicate that the operation had been active since June, during which the DRI seized 39 containers holding 1,115 metric tons of goods. Initial investigations suggest that the elaborate scheme was designed to evade taxes and facilitate other financial crimes, including money laundering.

ITBP officer dies after motorcycle collision in Shivpuri

Shivpuri: An Indo-Tibetan Border Police (ITBP) Havaldar was killed in a tragic road accident in Shivpuri this morning. Havaladar Lalu Yadav, 35, a native of Balia, Uttar Pradesh, who was stationed at the ITBP's telecom battalion, died after his scooter was hit by a motorcycle.

Another ITBP officer, Surendra Yadav, and the motorcyclist, Amar Rajput, were also injured in the collision.

The accident occurred around 7 a.m. when Havaladar Yadav and another officer, Surendra Yadav, left the ITBP gate on a scooter to get milk. A motorcycle coming from the Jhansi Tihra side on the



Theme Road collided with their scooter. Lalu Yadav suffered severe injuries and died at the scene.

Following the accident, fellow officers and local residents rushed the injured to the district hospital, where doctors pronounced Yadav dead. The news of his death cast

a pall of grief over the ITBP campus. The sorrow was palpable among his colleagues, many of whom were seen with tearful eyes. The sight of his distraught wife and young son brought tears to the eyes of everyone present. His wife collapsed from shock and was comforted by female ITBP personnel.

Imposter cop arrested for trying to swindle slain man's family



Indore: Months after the high-profile murder of Raja Raghuvanshi, a man wearing a police uniform with three stars on his shoulder arrived at the grieving family's home with a sinister intent. The impersonator was arrested after the family grew suspicious of his claims.

The incident occurred in the Rajendra Nagar police station area on Thursday. The man, who identified himself as Bajrang Lal Jat from Ratangarh, Rajasthan, approached Raja's mother, touched her feet, and claimed he was a close friend of her late son. He told her he was a Railway Police officer posted in Ujjain and had met Raja at the Mahakal temple in 2021.

However, the family quickly became suspicious. Raja's

brother, Vipin, knew Raja had not traveled anywhere in 2021 due to the COVID-19 lockdown. When Vipin asked for his ID, the man's story unraveled. Vipin immediately contacted the Crime Branch, who confirmed that Bajrang Lal Jat was neither a police officer nor a railway employee.

Police swiftly arrived at the scene and arrested him. During questioning, the accused confessed to his intentions, stating that he saw news of Raja's death on social media and arrived to take advantage of the family's grief. Authorities are now investigating his past criminal record and potential network, as it was revealed he had impersonated a police officer before.

Husband shoots, kills wife in front of son to hide affair

Indore: A horrific crime has come to light in the Kanadia police station area where a man allegedly shot and killed his wife in front of their three-year-old son to conceal an extramarital affair. The accused, a bus driver named Ishwar, 35, was arrested after his confession.

The victim, Rani, also 35, worked as a nanny at a school where her son was a student. According to police, she had been confronting her husband about his affair with a schoolteacher, Tausiba.

On Thursday evening, as Rani and her son were returning home



from school, Ishwar, wearing a helmet, arrived on a motorcycle with an accomplice. He shot her at

close range. The child later told police, "I heard a sound like firecrackers and my mom fell." Rani died at the scene.

After the murder, Ishwar attempted to cover it up by taking his wife to MY Hospital and claiming she was in an accident. However, a post-mortem revealed a gunshot wound, leading to his arrest. Ishwar, who had been drinking in his car when found by police, has since confessed. Investigators are now searching for his accomplice. Rani is survived by her two children, a seven-year-old daughter and a three-year-old son.

Students rally for school repairs in Neemuch

Neemuch: In a unique protest in the village of Rangaspuriya, located in the Neemuch district of Madhya Pradesh, children have taken a stand regarding the dilapidated condition of their school building. On the occasion of Independence Day, students voiced their demands for repairs to the crumbling school infrastructure. They created banners and slogans to draw attention from the government administration and organized a rally throughout the village.

The condition of both the secondary and primary schools in Rangaspuriya has deteriorated significantly. During the rally, the children showcased a banner titled "School Repair Movement," which featured messages such as "The roof will fall, life will be lost," "When will the government come?" and "We need a place to study; we want our school to be



good." Despite repeated applications from the villagers for repairs to the school roof, there has been no response from the authorities. In an effort to highlight the urgent



need for action, the students chanted slogans throughout the village, sending a clear message to the government and administration to address the poor condition of their school promptly.

3 teachers removed in Dhar after suicide by girl student

Dhar: In a heartbreaking incident in Manawar, 17-year-old Parvati Verma, a student at Government Girls Higher Secondary School, took her own life, leading to the removal of three teachers accused of harassment. In her suicide note, Parvati named Sarika Thakur, Lakshmi Mandloi, and Aarti Chauhan, alleging that they subjected her to mental harassment. According to her family, just hours before her tragic decision, Parvati expressed to friends her desire to end her life due to the relentless bullying she faced at school.

Parvati's father, Mohan Verma, mother Asha Verma, and sister Nisha Verma stated that the teachers had a deep-seated animosity towards her and frequently threatened her.
