Khalid Jamil explains Sunil Chhetri's exclusion from India preparatory camp

The exclusion of Sunil Chhetri from Indian football team's first preparatory camp under new head coach Khalid Jamil for the 2025 CAFA Nations Cup has sparked discussion but Jamil insists the striker has not been shut out.

Jamil announced his list of players for the preparatory camp on Friday with Chhetri's omission standing out. The veteran forward, who retired in June 2024 before reversing his decision in March earlier this year, remains a central figure for the Indian football team. However, Jamil gave a clear answer when asked about why Chhetri wasn't included in the preparatory camp. "Sunil is a legend of Indian football. I have played against him, I've seen him play on numerous occasions, and he is one of my favourite players. He is a role model for Indian football, and the door is always open for him," said Jamil.

"He's not there in this camp because we are playing a tournament which will essentially serve as a preparation for our Asian Cup Qualifiers," he said.

"I also want to try out a few other players during this FIFA window. I had a talk with him about the same. It's always a pleasure to have a player like him in the team,"

The Indian national football team has kicked off their preparations for the upcoming CAFA Na-tions Cup under newly appointed head coach Jamil.

Jamil, who made his mark with Jamshedpur FC by taking back the Men of Steel among the best in the Indian Super League (ISL) and cup competitions, now steps into his dream role, leading the Blue

Tigers.
"It is my pleasure to serve the country. It has always been my dream to do this, and it has now come true, so that feels very good There is a big task ahead of us, and we've got many areas that we need to work on. I am fully aware how big a responsibility it is for me, but feel thankful that the Federation (AIFF) felt me worthy to be en-

trusted with it," Jamil expressed. The challenge ahead is far greater. India are struggling in the AFC Asian Cup qualifiers, with just one point from their opening two matches and sitting at the bottom of the group The CAFA Nations Cup, starting August 29 in Tajik istan, gives Jamil an early chance test his squad against opponents like Tajikistan, IR Iran and Afghanistan before the next quali-

fier in October.

Swiatek claims first Cincinnati Open title with win over Paolini

Cincinnati/New Delhi, (UNI): World No. 2 Iga Swiatek lifted her first Cincinnati Open title, defeating Italy's Jasmine Paolini 7-5, 6-4 in the women's singles final.

According to the statement issued by Olympics.com, "Iga Swiatek won her first Cincinnati Open title with a 7-5, 6-4 victory over Jasmine Paolini on Monɗay (18 August).

Highlighting the scale of her achievement, Olympics.com said, "In 1 hour, 49 minutes of grinding tennis, Swiatek - the first Polish player to win in singles at the tournament - beat Paolini for the sixth time in as many meetings in a match-up of first-time finalists. She has dropped just one set against the

The victory was another milestone in her already illustrious career. It was Swiatek's 24th career title on the tour, her 11th at the 1000 level. The six-time Grand Slam champion did not lose a single set en route to the championship, as per the

It further added, "Cincinnati was Swiatek's second title of the season following her triumph at Wimbledon. She heads to the US Open as the No. 2 seed singles and is paired with Casper Ruud in the revamped mixed doubles event

Tejas has been in fine fettle too, clocking his second fastest time ever of 13.51s at the Meeting voor Mon — a World Athletics Challenger level meet — in Belgium over the weekend.
