Bank heist in BOI Ujjain foiled



Ujjain: Ujjain police, under the leadership of Superintendent of Police Pradeep Sharma, have solved a major bank robbery within 24 hours. The swift operation led to the arrest of five individuals, including a bank insider, and the recovery of an estimated Rs 5

crore in jewelry and Rs 8 lakh in cash. The inside job: The theft, which occurred at the State Bank of India's Mahananda Nagar branch, was masterminded by Jai Bhavsar, an outsourced employee. Bhavsar, who had been working at the bank for six months,

planned the robbery after a fire incident on August 16th exposed vulnerabilities during a stock transfer. He enlisted four accomplices—Abdullah, Sahil, Arbaz, and Kohinoor—to exe-

The heist and arrest: The group met on Monday night and entered the bank around 2:30 AM. Using keys, Bhavsar and Abdullah gained access to the main gate and lockers, making off with the valuables. Early Tuesday morning, a cleaner discovered the open lockers and reported the theft. Following a review of CCTV footage and a quick investigation, police identified Bhavsar and his associates, arresting all five and recovering the stolen goods. The rapid resolution marks a significant success for the Ujjain police force. The case, which initially appeared to be a professional heist, was quickly revealed to be an inside job, thanks to the meticulous work of the investigation team.

Student's death in Khargone hostel sparks outrage over negligence

Condition deteriorated after administration of injection by quack



nior Tribal Boys Hostel, Balkwada, Khargone, has raised serious concerns after the death of an 11th-grade student, Suresh, son of Mukesh Keer. The boy fainted after receiving an injection from a local village doctor, identified as Pappu Chauhan, and died while being taken to the district hospital. According to reports, Suresh had been

suffering from cold and cough. Instead of taking him to the district hospital for proper treatment, the hostel management called a rural practitioner, often described as a quack. After dinner around 7 p.m., the doctor administered an injection, but Suresh's condition rapidly deteriorated. Despite efforts to rush him to the hospital, he passed away on the way.

Mukesh, a resi dent of Bhopalpura under Balkwada police station, has demanded strict action against those at fault.

Substandard sewer project turns Mandla's streets into a minefield

Mandla: A critical sewer line project, intended to protect the Narmada River from pollution, has become a major public hazard even before it's operational. The 140kilometer-long project has torn up city roads, leaving behind a trail of potholes and shoddy repair work that has become a nightmare for commuters, especially during the rainy season.

Local residents and officials are raising alarms about the poor quality of the materials used. Manhole covers, installed just three months ago, are already cracking and collapsing under vehicle weight, creating dangerous haz-

Farmer leader Shiv Singh said, "Even after waiting for 48 hours, fertilizers are not being provided. Sowing is getting affected badly." Another farmer, Harish Prajapati. accused the administration of turning a blind eye to rampant black marketing. "Fertilizers are being sold at higher prices or given only to influential farmers. Ordinary farmers are returning empty-handed," he said.

Cong slams lathicharge: The agitation also drew political and legal voices. Advocate B.K. Mala claimed

that fertilizers had run out in several committees, leaving farmers helpless after waiting 10–12 hours. Congress spokesperson Vinod Sharma criticized the lathicharge, asking, "What crime have farmers committed by demanding fertiliz-er?" However, Collector Pratibha Pal refuted allegations of shortage, asserting that sufficient stock was available. She said distribution was being closely monitored through cooperative societies and private vendors. Additional Collector Sap-na Tripathi and SDM Vaishali Jain added that facilities like shade, drinking water and ORS packets were being arranged for farmers at Rewa Krishi Upaj Mandi.

Remained digitally arrested for 40 hours; woman among 3 held

Ujjain woman falls victim to

Ujjain: A woman from Basant Vihar, Uijain, became a victim of a sophisticated cyber fraud scheme, resulting in her being digitally arrested for 40 hours. Saroi Mali, a 50-year-old woman whose husband was a retired army officer, lived alone as her children worked outside the city. Due to health issues, she was staying with her sister in Nagda when the ordeal began. On August 12, Saroj received a call from a person claiming to be a police officer from the Birla Gram police station. The caller accused her of illegally keeping turtles and fish at her home and insisted that she register a First Information Report (FIR). The caller's intimidation tactics prevented Saroj from reaching out for help. During this time, another caller, posing as a police officer, further instilled

fear in Saroj, leading her to mortgage her jewelry and transfer Rs 5,09,000 to the fraudsters. The criminals visited her home on August 14 to collect the money threatening her by claiming to be from the Crime Branch. Later realizing she had been deceived, Saroj filed a complaint at the Birla Gram Police Station on Augus 15. Investigating officers utilized CCTV footage to identify the suspects. Three person, including a woman named Yukt Bairagi, were arrested based on call details and their connection to the fraud The police suspect that someone may have leaked information about the turtles in Saroj's home, prompting the fraudulent scheme. The investigation continues to uncover the full extent of the crime and any potential accomplices.
