**Bhopal:** Madhya Pradesh Congress media in-charge Dr. Mukesh Nayak on Tuesday strongly condemned the new labour codes enforced by the Central Government from 22 November 2025, calling them a "grave assault on workers' hard-earned rights". Addressing a press briefing at the Pradesh Congress Committee headquarters, Dr. Nayak said the four new codes created by subsuming 29 existing labour laws had been imposed under the guise of "ease of doing business", but in reality pushed workers into a new era of insecurity, instability and exploitation.

He said the codes violated the core constitutional values of equality, justice and dignity, and reiterated that the Congress Party remained firmly committed to safeguarding the interests of the working class. The party, he added, demanded their immediate withdrawal. Senior Congress leaders including MPCC general secretary Anuma Acharya, spokesperson Bhupendra Gupta, Ravi Saxena and Vikram Choudhary were present. Following the President's assent, the Industrial Relations Code 2020, the Occupational Safety, Health and Working Conditions Code 2020, and the Social Security Code 2020 have now become law. The Wage Code 2019 had already been enacted earlier. Dr. Nayak said the Ministry of Labour had announced implementation of all four codes from April 2021, under which 29 Cen-

tral labour laws would automatically cease to exist. He alleged that the codes severely weakened workers' rights. Citing an example, he noted that Section 13 of the Wage Code empowered the government to fix working hours even after minimum wages were determined meaning the "normal working day" could legally be extended to 10 or 12 hours. Although the Occupational Safety Code limits the workday to eight hours, the provision for overtime remained vague and left entirely to the discretion of the government, giving employers unchecked freedom to extend working hours. He reminded that the eight-hour



workday was rooted in the historic May Day movement and that Dr. B.R. Ambedkar had ensured its implementation in India. The labour codes, he argued, rolled back gains achieved over generations, making it necessary to revise history to resist "the anti-worker onslaught of corporate forces and the government".

Dr. Nayak further criticised provisions that curtailed the powers of labour inspectors, replacing inspections with a "facilitator" model and legitimising self-certification by employers. He warned that the new adjudication system, which diluted independent labour courts and concentrated authority in administrative tribunals, opened the door to executive interference in justice.

He highlighted concerns regarding the exclusion of supervisors earning above Rs 18,000 a month from the definition of 'worker', the legitimisation of fixed-term employment, the restrictions on trade unions, stringent limitations on strikes, changes in the definition of factories and dilution of safety standards. These changes, he said, amounted to "hire and fire at will", undermining job security for millions. Concluding, Dr. Nayak said, "The new labour codes are a direct attack on workers and violate the basic spirit of the Constitution. The Congress Party stands firmly with the working class and demands that these codes be withdrawn immediately."

## Missing minor rescued under 'Muskan Campaign'

MP Nagar police trace girl missing since May 2023

**Bhopal:** The MP Nagar Police Station has achieved a significant success under the special "Muskan Campaign," tracing and safely recovering a minor girl who had been missing since May 2023. Nine-month search concludes successfully: The case originated on May 22, 2023, when the 15-year-old girl, a resident of Shivaji Nagar, MP Nagar, went missing from her home. Her mother initially believed the girl had gone to a friend's house but reported the matter when she did not return. A case was registered under Section 363 (Kidnapping) of the Indian Penal Code against an unknown person. Special campaign yields results: Following specialized instructions from Police Headquarters for the recovery of missing children, a dedicated team was formed under the guidance of DCP-Zone 2 and ACP Manish Bhardwaj.

## TI Sapre's line-attachment order revoked within 24 hours

► Administrative U-turn likely after opposition by Hindu outfits

**Bhopal:** In a surprising development, Superintendent of Police (SP) Ramsharan Prajapati on Monday afternoon issued an order placing TI Ashish Sapre, station in-charge of Bhopal's rural area, on the line. The order directed him to report to the station immediately. However, within just 24 hours, the decision was reversed, and the earlier directive withdrawn.

**Action purely administrative: SP**

According to police sources, the initial action was taken following allegations that TI Sapre had threatened to shift the local cattle fair and misbehaved with traders. After receiving information about the order, Sapre visited the SP's office on Monday

evening to present his explanation. Despite his clarification, the SP initially remained firm on the decision. But later that night, a second order was unexpectedly issued from the SP's office, revoking the line-attachment directive. TI Sapre will continue in his position. SP Prajapati termed the move "purely administrative" and officially confirmed the revocation on Tuesday. Meanwhile, according to police sources, after the order to place the TI on the line was released, several Hindu organizations began protest. They warned of intensifying protests if the order was not withdrawn. As pressure mounted, the process of withdrawing the order began late at night.

## Rail traffic disrupted by Jhansi yard work

**Bhopal:** Due to crucial track renewal work at Virangana Lakshmibai Jhansi Station, several trains passing through the Bhopal Division will be cancelled, diverted, or delayed between November 25, 2025, and January 8, 2026.

### Key cancellations

12 trains, including weekly services like Bengaluru City-Lalkuan (05073/05074) and Hubballi-Yognagar Rishikesh (07363/07364), have been fully cancelled.

### Route diversions

A total of 25 trains, including the Haridwar-LTT (12172) and Hazrat Nizamuddin-Nanded (12754), will run on altered routes, primarily diverting via Mathura-Bayana-Sogaria-Ruthiyai-Bina or Gwalior-Guna-Bina.

### Delays expected

Trains like Bandra T-VGLB Jhansi (22196) will be regulated (delayed) by up to 90 minutes on the North Central Railway section. Passengers should check NTES or Rail Madad (139) before travel.

## New twists emerge in Viceroy Colony assault case

► Conflicting claims deepen mystery in Shahpura attack

**Bhopal:** New revelations continue to surface in the November 20 incident at Viceroy Colony under Shahpura police station. The accused had reportedly come to assault Shekhar Srivastava, son of Karera's District Panchayat CEO Sanjeet Srivastava, but Shekhar was not at home. Instead, three men arrived on a scooter and attacked people outside with sticks and rods. CCTV footage of the assault has now emerged. Shekhar's mother filed an FIR identifying all the youths creating chaos in the colony as attackers. However, one of the names in the FIR, Arjun Chaturvedi, presented evidence showing his car was parked outside Narmada Hospital during the incident, as

confirmed by CCTV. Conflicting statements and escalating tensions: Arjun's family claims he was earlier beaten by Shekhar and his friends in Arera Hills, leaving him with a fractured arm. His friends later went to speak with Shekhar but were allegedly attacked instead, as seen in video footage seized by police.

Meanwhile, Shekhar's mother, Vishakha Srivastava, alleged that 15-20 boys came looking for her son at night, threatening to kill him. Police have also identified Suyash Sharma, son of Beawar SDOP, among the attackers. Seven accused, including sons of lawyers and businessmen, remain absconding.

## Woman disrupts public hearing, claims to be an MLA

► Uproar at Bhopal Collectorate

**Bhopal:** A public hearing held at the Bhopal Collectorate on Tuesday was disrupted for over half an hour when a woman caused a scene inside the meeting hall. Despite repeated attempts by female police officers and guards to calm her down, she refused to cooperate and even introduced herself as an MLA, leading to widespread confusion.

### Officials attempt to restore order:

The hearing, which took place from 11 a.m.

to 1 p.m. and was attended by more

than 100 people, was thrown off track

when Shobhana Singh, who had

come with her complaint, began

shouting after officials informed her that her issue fell under police jurisdiction. District Panchayat CEO Ela Tiwari and ADM Ankur Meshram tried to pacify her, but she remained adamant.

Shobhana, a resident of Minal Residency, had also attended a hearing three months earlier with similar complaints. She alleged that on December 9, 2022, a man named Mansharam threatened her to vacate her house and continues to harass her, despite her having a valid 11-month rental contract. She claims to be living in fear with her 11-year-old daughter.
