**Bhopal:** In a wide-ranging set of decisions, the Cabinet, led by Chief Minister Dr. Mohan Yadav, approved crucial measures spanning infrastructure, industry, and employee welfare. The meeting, which began with the traditional singing of Vande Mataram at the Secretariat, focused heaviy on providing enhanced relief and ensuring long-term project viability across the

#### Major boost for displaced families

The Cabinet approved a massive Rs ,782 crore special package for families affected by the submergence caused by the Upper Narmada, Raghavpur, and Basania Multipurpose Projects in Anuppur, Mandla, and Dindori districts. This amount is in addition to the Rs 1,656 crore already provisioned. The total project cost is Rs 5,512 crore and will irrigate 71,967 hectares and generate 125 MW of electricity. The package ensures a compensation of Rs 12.50 lakh per family for the nearly 13,873 affected families, with an additional sum earmarked for about 50,000 Scheduled Caste and Scheduled Tribe families.

#### Metro and rural road funding

The operational continuity of major urban infrastructure was secured with the



and Indore Metro Rail Projects for the financial year 2025-26. Separately, rural connectivity received a boost, with permission granted for 3,810 works costing approximately Rs 693 crore 76 lakh under the Chief Minister's Village Road and Infra-

#### Entrepreneurship and employment overhaul

The Cabinet backed youth entrepre neurship by approving the continuation of the Chief Minister's Udyam Kranti Yojana until the year 2030-31, with an expenditure of Rs 905 crore 25 lakh. The scheme provides bank loans from Rs 50,000 to Rs 50 lakh for youth aged 18 to 45, along with a 3% annual interest subsidy.

In a key administrative reform, the distinction between sanctioned permanent and temporary posts in state government departments was approved for elimination. This measure seeks to convert existing sanctioned temporary posts into permanent ones, promoting job security and reducing disparities across the workforce.

#### Investment in forestry research

Finally, the Cabinet sanctioned Rs 48 crore for the establishment of six Forest Science Centers across the state from 2025–26 to 2029–30. These centers aim to boost forestry expansion outside forest areas, increase land productivity, and promote agroforestry, allowing even non-gov-ernment organizations to participate with

#### MP gripped by intense cold wave 22 districts under fog and chill alert

Bhopal: Madhya Pradesh is currently reel ing under a fierce cold wave coupled with dense fog, significantly impacting daily life. The Meteorological Department has issued a weather alert for 22 districts across the state, with an Orange Alert declared for 12 of them. Visibility in these areas is expected to drop as low as 50 me ters, making travel hazardous. Minimum temperatures across several cities have plummeted to around 6°C, intensifying

the winter chill.

Temperatures fall, new disturbances loom: Over the past 24 hours, the districts of Bhopal, Raisen, Indore, and Shajapu felt the distinct impact of the cold wave The highest drop in maximum temperature was recorded in the Ujjain division falling by 2.4°C. The Bhopal division recorded minimum temperatures up to 4.8°C below normal, signaling severe cold conditions. Weather scientists attribute the current conditions to a cyclonic circulation over the Jammu region and a strong subtropical westerly jet stream.



# Fog grounds flights: 22 Indore-bound services cancelled amid Delhi smog



**Indore:** Air travel woes continue for passengers as relief from earlier Indigo flight disruptions is immediately overshadowed by dense fog in Delhi. The severe weather has crippled air traffic, directly impacting operations at Indore Airport.

According to airport sources, a total of 16 flights connecting Indore to Delhi and onward to

visibility. The situation worsened this morning, with six more flights (between 6:30 AM and 9:00 AM) scrapped, bringing the two-day total of cancelled services to 22

The cancellations, which included five Delhi flights and one Jaipur flight this morning, stranded thousands of passengers and caused chaos at the airport. An Air India flight, scheduled for Delhi, was among those cancelled, leading to an uppear RIP leader Coxi Nome and other passen roar. BJP leader Gopi Nema and other passengers, who had already reached the airport, protested, claiming the airline failed to provide timely cancellation alerts via message.

Airport officials confirmed that the schedule remained disturbed throughout the day, forcing the cancellation of flights to Goa, Pune, Ahmedabad, and Gondia as well, compounding the travel misery for passengers.
